From our Minister, Norman Croft:

Jeremiah was called by God to be His prophet to Israel at a crucial time in the nation's history, When the nation was deliberately turning from God. (Sounds familiar?) His ministry was lonely and unpopular, causing him grief and disappointment. Yet despite this, Jeremiah found strength and courage to do the job God had given him. We can, if we want, make changes to our world. To do so we need to develop the same relationship that Jeremiah had with God. So let us look at what we can learn from scripture about Jeremiah and his growing relationship with God. (See Jeremiah Chapter 1) As with us, sometimes he felt hopelessly inadequate for the task, and like a child, wanted to run away from the situation. So how did God respond?

He equipped him

God gave Jeremiah the tools he needed to complete the tasks that God had in mind for him. (verses 5 and 9) So with all his servants God provides the gifts and equipment necessary to tackle the job in hand.

God was present with him

God sent Jeremiah out and promised always to be with him. (verses 7 and 8) When God gives us a job to do He answers our inadequacy and weakness with His strength.

God gives us authority

God gave Jeremiah the authority to speak for Him. (verse 10) Our message for the world comes with the authority of God Himself.

God gives assurance

God kept watch over Jeremiah all the time. (verses 11 - 12) We can be sure that God is still keeping watch over us and our world today.

God gives understanding

God showed Jeremiah He understood what he was up against. (verses 13 - 16) Likewise, God knows what is happening in our world and He understands the pressures were are working under, and so, likewise, will offer us the support we need.

The secret of Jeremiah's life despite his fears and doubts and the opposition he experienced, was that he found in God the strength to fulfil the mission to the world that he had been given (verses 17 - 19)

All this can be true in our lives if we, as Jeremiah did, hand our lives over to the Lord!

Mum continues to enjoy hearing news and reading this publication but has admitted that she probably will not be able to be with you physically to worship again, although she remains very much with you in thought and prayer and as a member of your church. Her home, for almost two years, has been St Joseph's Nursing Home at the end of East Street, where visitors are always welcome.

This newsletter will continue to be of great importance to Mum as my husband Nick and I set off on a Big Adventure: we are moving some 700 miles north to live on the Orkney Islands off the north coast of Scotland. It is an area that we love and we hope to make the move in September - yes, just in time for the long, dark winters! We will, of course, be back regularly to visit Mum but please do keep her in your prayers as we move away. She knows all about it and, in many ways, is surprised that we didn't do this some thirty years ago! The landscape of Orkney is soft and undulating, very like the South Downs. It is not at all mountainous like the Highlands.

As I write this I have made an interesting discovery! I have attended both the Catholic Church and St Magnus Cathedral in Kirkwall, the capital of Orkney, but the greatest number of cars are generally outside the Peedie (small) Kirk, opposite the great, red-stoned Cathedral building. "The truth is hard to swallow"

Quote from Water Aid.

The Circuit Justice and Peace Group was born in 2011 in the belief that great oaks from little acorns grow when we *Act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God* Micah ch6 v8. The group defined Social Justice as an idea of creating a society based on the principles of equality and solidarity, accepting the values of human rights and dignity of every human being.

A circuit audit in 2012 showed the wide variety and commitment of members to concerns of justice without which peace cannot be achieved. That audit showed that 88 of the 271, that is one third of respondents were concerned about and/or involved with **Water Aid**, and water was 9th of 71 justice related concerns nominated across the Circuit.

In 2017/18 the J&P group is focussing on water as a justice issue and John Carr has presented a powerful report which will be shared at the Circuit Meeting on September 11th and at a circuit gathering and service planned at Westergate at 4pm on February 11th 2018, Racial Justice Sunday.

This is to "whet your appetite" and hopefully get you on board as individuals and church communities.

John's report tells us of many gloomy stories, where governments fail and water is used as a weapon of war, but also of much technological simple advance, enabling local projects to be effective on the ground in small communities. That is where you and I come in. We can grasp the nettle by accepting the slogan:-

It's simple Don't get bogged down Spend a penny

Give a penny Flush away poverty.

The proposed Toilet Twinning Project
