Keeping our church together

With one day very much like the day before, it is a little ironic that the Government decided to move the Bank Holiday from Monday to Friday. The reason, of course, was to celebrate the 75th anniversary of VE Day Friday 8th May 1945. Corona Virus has added a grim relevance to the celebrations with the inevitable comparisons to the days of World War II. None of the celebrations will be happening as originally planned, although the BBC has programmes scheduled including Churchill's announcement that the war with Germany was over. The jubilation and thanksgiving were fuelled by the sense of relief that the war was over, even if slightly premature—it was two months and two atomic bombs before the Japanese surrendered, the horror of Nazi concentration camps was just emerging, rationing continued until 1953 and the war loan not fully repaid until 2006.

We still have a long way to go before we win the war with corona virus and our faith and our determination will be tested in the weeks to come but as the Daily Sketch reminded us (The rectangle on the bottom right of the page)

"...Thanks to the Father..... who has delivered us from the power of darkness." The full quotation, from 1 Colossians verses 12 to 14, uses the metaphor, common in the New Testament, of light and dark. "He has rescued us from the power of darkness and has transferred us into the kingdom of His beloved Son."

From the Minister's desk

This week I want to share with you about the birth of the New Church and the work the *chief shepherd* being Jesus Christ ~ the Good Shepherd. This is based on the Gospel of (John 10:1—10 and Acts 2:40-47). Luke is given to us the author of Acts of the Apostle, because of the way both, the Gospel Luke and Acts are introduced in the introductory verses of both books. In Acts 2:40-47 we are introduced to the quality of the church that, they were 3120 people who gathered as new church.

Luke introduces to us the miracle power of the Holy Spirit that came upon the first church. What is interesting is what happened there after the 3120 people came together as a church. This is what I call the marks or signs and attributes of the first church. But before I explain what happened, there after let me draw your attention to the follow synopsis. The new church came together from premise of confusion, fear, anxiety and it was unprecedented time after the departure of their leader and the disciples couldn't take it in that they were now without Jesus in flesh anymore in real life. It was like this, our time we are going through now in the world with COVID19. This is a difficult time for both young and old. The disciples had to isolate themselves from the rest of the people because of fear, confusion and anxiety. We are lockdown, isolated and no touch of each, a special attributed of the presence of the Holy Spirit of the first church. People are in limbo for fear of this menacing virus called COVID19.

Peter preaching on the miracle power of the Holy Spirit reminds of the attributes that characterises the new church, that they devoted to the apostles' doctrine, fellowship (Koinonia) and the breaking of bread and prayer, signs and wanders, having all things in common, sharing of possessions and goods, a united church under the miracle power of the Holy Spirit. What will today's church do when we come out of the lockdown and when the virus is contained?

John 10:1-10 is a call to a passage -way into a new dawn, a new church, the church (flock of my sheep): Jesus Christ, the good Shepherd. Jesus said. "I am the door, If any one enters by me he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture." "This is the new church that is defined by the attributes of the miracle power of the Holy Spirit. "This is a time, if ever there was one, for vulnerability, honesty, and a tentative humility in theological reflection." We are that church that needs the miracle power of the Holy Spirit to overcome and be delivered from the pandemic menace of coronavirus. The Good Shepherd is with us, the miracle power of the Holy Spirit is with the church and we shall overcome and be delivered by the God, whose Son is the chief Shepherd of the flock. We are the flock of His pastures. I strongly believe that Our God will see us through this time of crisis, but "doing church" will be different.

The same miracle power of the Holy Spirit, needs to renew the church, because Jesus Christ came that we may have life and have it more abundantly.
