### Children of God

For we know how dearly God loves us, because he has given us the Holy Spirit to fill our hearts with his love.

# From the Leadership Team

We held a virtual meeting on Saturday morning to discuss our response to the Government's relaxation of the lock-down rules that allows churches to open their doors for private prayer. We had, to assist our deliberations, advice published by the Leadership of both the Methodist and United Reformed Churches.

The outcome of our discussion is a decision that it is too soon to be opening our building for private prayer.

We recognise that many of our members are looking forward to a time when we can meet again for worship together. Indeed, one of the reasons we come to church is to worship God in fellowship with others. Under the conditions that churches may open for private prayer, any form of corporate worship is not going to happen. Unlike shops and restaurants who are eager to get back to business as normal as soon as possible, a church is a meeting place and, at present, meeting together is not an option.

Another major factor in our decision that we took into account is our ages. Most of us are in that category that the government have called "Vulnerable". As such we should not be attempting to undertake any activity that puts us at risk of contracting Covid-19. Door stewarding, for example, while the church is open to the public, is not something any of us should be doing.

Finally, there are the physical difficulties of putting social distancing measures in place and the associated risk assessments. There are places of worship in Littlehampton better suited to opening for private prayer and we commend them to you if you wish to pray in the atmosphere of a religious sanctuary. (We understand that St Mary's and St Catherine's will be opening at some time)

We can assure you that we are keeping the situation under review. We pray that the rate of infection from Covid-19 will continue to fall and it will become safe to meet again.
