How good are you at remembering names, or recognising faces.? As a result of teaching in Worthing for 21 years I often encounter people who ask me if I remember them from school. I usually have to ask them their name. My excuse is that they looked very different at 16 years old than they now do as an adult. Actually, I'm just not good at remembering names, or recognising faces.

Last Friday morning, we read the Bible passage from Luke's gospel chapter 4, where Jesus returns to his home village of Nazareth. His reputation as a healer has gone before him. The folk in the synagogue are astounded when he announced that events foretold by the prophet Isaiah are happening right there and then. He is the one of whom the prophet spoke:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free,

To proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Isaiah 61, 1 and 2, 58: 6)

The congregation saw Jesus, the son of Joseph the carpenter, not the promised Messiah. They recognise the boy they knew well, but not the man who now stood before them as the Son of God.

The incident went from bad to worse. Jesus quoted an old saying "A prophet is not without honour, except in his home town" and illustrated it be recalling how Elijah was sent to a non-Jewish widow during a time of great famine, or Elisha who cured a Syrian lepper, ignoring those of his own country and religion.

This did not go down well. In fact, Jesus was taken outside by the crowd who had the intention of killing him. The people of Nazareth had recognised Jesus but had failed to appreciate that the boy they thought they knew was now a man who brought God's message of love to all the world.
